




BACKGROUND AND GOALS:


To implement a recreational fishing program for Mahseer in Bhutan, there needs to be a cadre of trained (and certified) fishing guides. Unfortunately, however, none of those currently exists. We identify a set of key informational topics that all guides should know. Finally, we propose a tiered approach to certifying fishing guides as well as a process by which Bhutan can develop that capacity internally.

High Level of experience in all topics including knowledge of the waters and safety, plus the ability to teach.

Fishing Guide

Moderate level of experience in all topics. including knowledge of the waters and safety.

Trail Guide

Basic level of experience in all topics, including knowledge of local trails, the waters, and safety.
